

1.9 LEADING AND READABILITY

As a general rule, newspaper designers have determined that the optimum column width for type is about one and one-half times the point size, in picas. That is, if your body copy is set in 10-point type, the optimum column width for that type is 15 picas (10 x 1.5). The minimum width is equal to the point size in picas (10 picas) and the maximum width is twice the point size in picas (20 picas). Any wider than that and readability suffers.

When type is set in a column with more narrow than the minimum recommended width, it is usually set flush left to avoid "rivers" of white space that can be distracting to the reader. When type is set in a column width wider than the maximum recommended width, it is usually set with additional leading so the reader's eyes don't drift down.

BONUS: You're working on creating a one-page newsletter with a page that is 51 picas wide with 3 pica margins on the outside and inside, giving you a printable area of 45 picas. How many columns, each separated by 1-pica gutters, can you divide this page into without making the columns too narrow or too wide? (Hint: There's more than one correct answer. The best answer will be a range.)
