CHAPTER 3 ONLINE EXERCISES

Objective:

These online activities will introduce you to the use of online newspapers.

Click on Online Exercise Links. You will see a list of Web site links that will bring you to different online newspapers. Use these Web sites to complete Activities 3.1 and 3.2.

Activity 3.1

- 1. Select one of the online newspaper Web sites to visit.
- 2. Key telecommunications in the **Search** box (some Web sites may use an **Enter Word** box).
- 3. Select an article about *telecommunications* that interests you. Print the article by clicking on the File menu and selecting Print. Click OK.
- 4. Search for articles that contain the following telecommunications terms: *cellular, modem, voice mail.* Select one article for each term that interests you and best relates to telecommunications. If a term is not listed in the newspaper Web site you selected, return to the *Business Communication at Work* Web site and select another. Once you've located each word, make a printout of each article.
- 5. Read each printout. Look for the following items in each sentence and paragraph: active voice, subject and verb agreement, independent and dependent clauses, parallel construction, and paragraph arrangement. Note on each article any errors in sentence and paragraph structure.
- 6. On a piece of paper, write a paragraph discussing the different sentence and paragraph structures in each article. Make sure you use correct sentence and paragraph structure in your writing.
- 7. Write your name on the front of each printout and your paper. Hand it in to your instructor.

Activity 3.2

- 1. Select one of the online newspaper Web sites to visit that is different from the site you selected in Activity 3.1.
- 2. Read the different options available at the newspaper Web site. Use the article to link to an article on a major current event that interests you.
- 3. Print the article by clicking on the File menu and selecting Print. Click OK.
- 4. Working from the printout, underline two examples of each of the four types of sentences. Above each sentence, identify the type. Use the following abbreviations: *S* (simple), *CMPD* (compound), *CMPLX* (complex), *CC* (compound-complex).
- 5. On the back of your printout, write a paragraph discussing the use of emphasis in the article you selected. Consider the following elements: position, proportion, repetition, balance, length of paragraphs, sentence structure, and mechanical techniques.
- 6. Write your name on the front of the printout, and hand it in to your instructor.
